This will not be assessed.


All non-core subjects will be run over three years and on 3 hours of study per week.

Students cannot choose a subject more than once.

Learning Pathways

Students will either follow the Learning Pathway 1
OR Learning Pathway 2.

ALL STUDENTS will select 2/3 (depending on pathway) subject options as well as their pathway options.



1. You now have the opportunity to discuss any option choices with your child.

2. You will have the opportunity to discuss any option choices with a subject specialist at an options event.

3. Your child will collect an options form from tutor time following the 'options event' and return it to main reception on completion.

English Literature/Language

What will I learn in this subject?

CORE SUBJECT!

Reading

Students will be provided with opportunities to read literary, non-literary and media texts, some of which will be whole works, and the work of a wide range of authors from a variety of cultures and times. The range of texts available to students will include poetry, plays, short stories, novels, anthologies, letters, travel books, newspapers, literature from different cultures, works of reference and electronic databases. All students are required to study a complete a work of Shakespeare.

Writing

Students will be provided with opportunities to write in a wide range of styles and forms, including critical and imaginative responses to the reading of literature. Students will be given opportunities to demonstrate that they can: write about their experiences and express what they feel and imagine; understand, order and present facts, ideas and opinions; show a sense of audience and an awareness of style in a variety of situations and use English grammar correctly.

Speaking & listening

Students will be given opportunities to demonstrate that they can: articulate experience and express what they feel and imagine; understand, order and present facts, ideas and opinions and communicate a sensitive personal response to what is heard, read and understood.

What will I do in lessons?

Lessons will consist of reading and analysing texts, planning and writing essays, note-taking, personal presentations, peer observation and class discussions.

How will this subject be of use in the future?

English is a subject that acts as a foundation for further study and for life after school. The course will provide you with a solid foundation on which to build your future, and effectively equip you with the knowledge, skills and understanding you need in order to be successful in an increasingly demanding world in the vital areas of reading, writing and speaking and listening. Most Post 16 offers and career pathways ask for, and may require, a grade 4 or above in English and Maths.

How will I be assessed?

2 Exams

Year 10

All students will complete their English Literature exam.

Year 11

All students will complete their English Language exam.

What qualification will I receive?

Edexcel English Language and English Literature (2 separate GCSEs).

Mathematics

Lvl 2

What will I learn in this subject?

The aims of the Mathematics Department relate to all year groups but are especially relevant to those students in Key Stage 4 who may be considering taking Mathematics after GCSE:

To develop an ability to think and reason mathematically.

To notice and realise the application of Mathematics in everyday life.

To have the understanding of how to use Mathematics up to GCSE level and create a firm foundation for those wishing to study the subject further.

What will I do in lessons?

Students in Year 10 will continue to study topics from the four major areas: number; algebra; shape, space and measures; and data handling. New topics are introduced under these headings such as errors in calculations, surds, solving quadratic equations and statistical measures.

Other topics are studied to a greater depth than in Year 9. Students will be expected to develop the ability to apply their mathematics to real-life contexts and have a good understanding of how to tackle unstructured questions.

How will this subject be of use in the future?

Mathematics is essential to students pursuing a wide range of careers, from accounting, computing and engineering to nursing and business. Mathematics is a benefit when studying many subjects at A-Level, including, Psychology, Sciences, Business Studies and Geography, as it allows students to understand and interpret results. Most Post 16 offers and career pathways ask for and may require a grade 4 or above in Maths and English.

How will I be assessed?

Higher tier (9 - 3); three exams taken at the end of Year 11. No Controlled Assessment.

Foundation tier (1 - 5); three exams taken at the end of Year 11. No Controlled Assessment.

GCSE AQA Combined Science Trilogy

Pupils study the course over Y9, 10 and 11. At the end of the course students will receive 2 GCSE grades from 1-1 to 9-9. Students will sit either foundation or higher examinations.

Our philosophy: Science for all!

We believe that science has something to offer every student, whatever their aspirations. From trainee chef to nuclear physicist, construction apprentice to cancer researcher, everyone needs some level of relevant scientific understanding. Science skills are transferable to many different careers and life in general.

Active learning is at the heart of science

There's no better way to learn about Science than through purposeful practical activities that form a natural part of day to day teaching and learning. The new science GCSE has a series of investigations that pupils can be questioned about in the final exam. Students will study the national curriculum in both Chemistry and Physics and then focus on one science for their Y11 exams. Some students will be selected to gain GCSEs in both Chemistry and Physics during Y11, this is separate to the Triple Science option.

All 6 exams (2 in biology, 2 in chemistry and 2 in physics) are sat at the end of Y11.

Duration: all the papers are 1 hour 15 minutes long.

Tiers: Foundation and Higher.

Weighting: the papers are equally weighted.

Question types: multiple choice, structured, closed, short answer and open response.

History

What will I learn in this subject?

During Year 9 we will continue to build on the skills required for GCSE. During the year we will study the development of democracy, World War One, World War Two, American Century and the fight for British Civil Rights. At GCSE we follow the AQA specification where students will complete two examinations at the end of Year 11. They will study, Germany 1890 - 1945: Democracy and dictatorship. Conflict and tension: The First World War, 1894-1918, Britain: Health and the people: c1000 to present day, and Elizabethan England.

What can I do after?

History is an academic subject which is highly respected by employers, colleges and universities alike, because of its wide range of thinking skills.

It is useful for many careers, for example:

How is it assessed?

You will sit two papers at the end of Year 11. Both are 2 hours.

Anything else I need to know?

If you enjoy learning about how people and events have contributed to creating the world we live in today this course may well be perfect for you.

You will gain an insight into why important figures in history did what they did and the impact these actions have had on Britain and the wider world.

You will also develop valuable skills such as reasoning, analysis, evaluation and interpretation skills.

You will also need to have excellent attendance, a work ethos and a genuine commitment to the subject and course. In addition to the work at school you will be expected to work at home, for example, completing homework, reading in preparation for work in school and assessments.

History is an academic subject, you will often be required to complete extended writing tasks and undertake reading for the course.

AQA Lvl 2

What will I learn in this subject?

The GCSE Geography course will build on the topics and skills learned over Key Stage 3. The focus will be on both physical and human geography and developing geographical skills over the three years of the course.

Living with the physical environment looks at natural hazards, the living world and UK landscapes Challenges in the human landscape looks at the challenges and issues of living in cities, the changing economic world, and the challenges and issues of the resources needed for people around the world.

Geographical application involves the development of map, graphical, mathematical and statistical skills. This will be done both in the classroom and through field work on site and further afield.

What can I do after?

Geography is an academic subject, which is highly respected by employers, colleges and universities alike. It has a wide range of thinking and practical skills. Some of those who study Geography at GCSE level carry on to A-Level and Degree.

It is useful for lots of careers, for example:

Teaching Civil Aviation

Engineering Business & Commerce Geology Environmental Science

Tourism Armed Services

And many others.

How is it assessed?

3 exams at the end of Year 11

Paper 1. Living with the physical environment.

Paper 2. Challenges in the human environment.

Paper 3. Geographical applications.

Anything else I need to know?

The course will not only develop your knowledge and understanding of the world in which you live, but will also provide you with a variety of skills such as literacy, numeracy, map reading, problem solving, enquiry skills to help you become an independent learner. As Geography is such a wide ranging subject it goes well with both science based and arts based subjects.

Year 9 will be a foundation year covering key content and skills prior to the main GCSE course.

In Year 10 and 11 students will study the new AQA geography GCSE syllabus.

Edexcel Lvl 2

What will I learn in this subject?

You will be assessed in 4 skills areas; Listening, Writing, Speaking and Reading.

There are five broad themes:

- 1. Identity and Culture
- 2. Local area, holiday and travel
- 3. School
- 4. Future aspirations, study and work
- 5. International and global dimension

The GCSE French course will build on the topics and skills learned over Key Stage 3. The focus will be on building on previous skills and improving your confidence in all 4 areas. You will develop the knowledge in discussing and contrasting opinions and wide range of topics, discussing world problems and using a range of new tenses.

What can I do after the course?

Research has shown that learning a language improves your problem solving skills and makes you more confident in difficult situations. Religious Education

AQA

What will I learn in this subject?

The GCSE RE course will build on the topics and skills learned over Key Stage 3.

The focus will be on both religious beliefs; and philosophical and Ethical studies.

What can I do after the course?

RE is an academic subject, which is highly respected by employers, colleges and universities alike. It has a wide range of thinking and practical skills.

It is useful for lots of careers, for example:

- Child and youth worker
- Journalist
- Activist
- Legal aid
- Charity coordinator
- Diplomat
- Social worker
- Teacher
- International aid worker

How will I be assessed?

Year 9 will be a foundation year covering key content and skills prior to the main GCSE course. In Year 10 and 11 students will study the AQA GCSE syllabus.

Assessment is through exams at the end of Year 11 with marks awarded as follows:

Component 1: Study of religions, beliefs, teachings and practices (Islam & Christianity). 1 hour 45 Minutes 50% of qualification You will:

- deepen your understanding of the relationship between people
- become informed about common and divergent views within traditions in the way beliefs and teachings are understood and expressed
- demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the fact that religious traditions of Great Britain are, in the main, Christian
- understand that religious traditions in Great Britain are diverse and include the following religions: Christianity, Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism and Sikhism, as well as non-religious beliefs, such as atheism and humanism.

Anything else I need to know?

RE will help develop your key skills in communication, working with others, problem solving and reflecting on your own learning. It will also give you skills in making decisions about moral problems, and help you to become sure about your own beliefs and explain them clearly to others. It will also help promote respect and tolerance for views opposite of your own and understand people of other cultures, beliefs and religions.

AQA Lvl 2

What will I learn in this subject?

You will take many, many photos! In GCSE you will have the opportunity to experiment with many photographic techniques such as painting with light, panorama, close-up, joiner, colour splash, mixed media, exploring composition and layering. You will develop your skills in Photoshop to manipulate your images in interesting ways!

How is it assessed?

60% coursework - This is made up of two projects. Both projects will include photo shoots, and exploring photographic techniques, planning personal photo shoots and producing a final outcome of your choice or technique. You will research, evaluate and analyse different photographers' work that will influence your own shooting and evaluate your own imagery.

40% exam - This is a practical exam. You will be given your exam question in the January of year 11. You will then have time to research, experiment, design and plan what you will do in your exam time. The exam is 10 hours long and it will take place over two days during this time you will be shooting and editing a final piece.

What can I do after?

(The jobs below are potential routes which would mean two years at college in this area)

- Portrait photographer
- Movie stills photographer
- Advertisement/ fashion photographer
- Sports photographer
- Travel photographer
- Medical photographer in theatre/ micro photographer (cells etc)
- · Wildlife/ animal photographer
- Music/gig/ wedding/ event photographer

- Editor for commercial photography

Anything else I need to know?

You need to be creative and passionate about photography to succeed. The coursework is quite time consuming so you must make sure you keep up to date with deadlines. As most of your work is digital you must be prepared to stay after school to complete any home/course work given. You also need to be prepared to write about your work and evaluate it in your logbook.



Art, Craft & Design

AQA Lvl 2

What will I learn in this subject?

Art, craft and design allows you to explore and create exciting art work such as drawings, paintings, sculptures, mixed media pieces, textiles and much more. You will be shown how to research relevant art and craft artists, designers and makers and learn how to display the research imaginatively and effectively.

You will learn and develop art and craft techniques and explore these, this will include drawing with both traditional and non-traditional materials, printmaking, embroidery, 3D sculpture with wire, fabric manipulation, painting with different paints and using different scales and much more. Towards the end of each project you will design and develop an exciting final outcome.

What can I do after?

(The jobs below are potential routes which could mean two years at college in this area)

- Artist
- Illustrator
- Maker
- Set designer for theatre, tv or film
- Interior designer
- Art restorer
- · Curator in a gallery
- Art therapist
- · Textile designer
- Surface pattern designer
- Art or textiles teacher/lecturer

How is it assessed?

60% coursework - This is made up of two projects. Both projects will include drawing, exploring art, craft and design techniques, creating design ideas and making a final outcome of your choice. This could be a drawing, painting, sculpture or mixed media piece. You also need to write about your own work and the work of other art/craft artists and designers.

40% exam - This is a practical exam. You will be given your exam question in the January of year 11. You will then have time to research, experiment, design and plan what you will do in your exam time. The exam is 10 hours long and it will take place over two days during this time you will be making a final piece. This could be a drawing, painting, sculpture or mixed media piece.

Anything else I need to know?

You need to be open minded and passionate about Arts and crafts to succeed. The coursework is quite time consuming and you will be expected to complete work independently in your own time. We have regular deadlines you will need to meet and you must be prepared to write about your work and evaluate it in your sketchbook as this is an essential part of the course.



Graphic Design

AQA Lvl 2

What will I learn in this subject?

When you judge a book by its cover, choose a product because you have seen the ad, instantly recognise a company by its logo, or go to a movie after seeing a poster, then you are responding to visual messages - this is what graphic communication is all about.

What can I do after?

(The jobs below are potential routes which would mean two years at college in this area)

- Graphic Designer University route
- Graphic Designer Apprenticeship route
- · Web designer
- Architecture
- Marketing Manager
- · Film and Video Editor
- Animation
- Freelance Illustrator
- Surface pattern designer
- · Graphics or art teacher

You will learn to be a creative and explore different ways to communicate messages - this will be done both by hand and digitally using creative computer software to combine photographs illustrations and typography. We will explore the basics of Photoshop and Illustrator to edit pictures and to develop typefaces to create designs that communicate a message.

How is it assessed?

60% Coursework - This is made up of two projects. Both projects will include drawing, exploring different design techniques, creating design ideas and making a final outcome of your choice. This could be poster designs, book covers or brand identity. You also need to write about your own work and the work of other graphic designers.

40% Exam - This is a practical exam. You will be given your exam question in the January of year 11. You will then have time to research, experiment, design and plan what you will do in your exam time. The exam is 10 hours long and it will take place over two days during this time you will be making a final piece.

Anything else I need to know?

You need to be creative and passionate about graphic design to succeed. The coursework is quite time consuming so you must make sure you keep up to date with deadlines. You also need to be prepared to write about your work and evaluate it in your sketchbook.







Fashion & Textiles

AQA Lvl 2

What will I learn in this subject?

You will learn to be creative! Each project will start with researching and drawing this will then be translated into textile techniques. Throughout your GCSE you will explore different techniques including screen printing, sublimation printing, fabric dying, resist fabric dying, block printing,

hand embroidery, machine embroidery, applique, reverse applique and fabric manipulation. You will learn to design and make clothes and interior textile items as well as textile art!

What can I do after?

(The jobs below are potential routes which could mean two years at college in this area)


How is it assessed?

60% coursework - This is made up of two projects. Both projects will include drawing, exploring textile techniques, creating design ideas and making a final outcome of your choice. This could be clothing, an interior item or a piece of textile art. You also need to write about your own work and the work of other textile artists.

40% exam - This is a practical exam. You will be given your exam question in the January of year 11. You will then have time to research, experiment, design and plan what you will do in your exam time. The exam is 10 hours long and it will take place over two days during this time you will be making a final piece. This could be a fashion item, an interior item or a piece of textile art.

Anything else I need to know?

You need to be creative and passionate about fashion & textiles to succeed. The coursework is quite time consuming so you must make sure you keep up to date with deadlines. You also need to be prepared to write about your work and evaluate it in your sketchbook.



Citizenship Studies

Edexcel Lvl 2

What will I learn in this subject?

Citizenship Studies is about how people take an active part in democratic politics and work together for a better society, locally, nationally and globally.

Students are encouraged to express opinion and consider views of others to form sustained and reasoned arguments.

GCSE Citizenship involves the study of 5 main themes:

- 1. Living together in the UK
- 2. Democracy at work in the UK
- 3. Law and Justice
- 4. Power and influence
- 5. Taking citizenship action

What can I do after?

GCSE Citizenship is a nationally recognised qualification recognised by colleges, universities and employers.

It may be useful for a range of careers, including:

Journalist Police Politician Civil Servant Magistrate Teacher Marketing Research Law

How is it assessed?

In GCSE Citizenship there are two written exams in May/June of Year 11.

Paper 1 - This covers the three themes within the course in a range of question styles.

Paper 2 - This paper asks students to reflect upon their own active citizenship which they will have completed during the course.

Anything else I need to know?

Citizenship gives pupils the knowledge, skills and understanding to play an effective role in society at local, national and international levels.

It helps them to become more informed, thoughtful and responsible citizens who are aware of their duties and rights, promoting their spiritual, moral, social and cultural development making them more self confident and responsible both in and beyond the classroom.

Citizenship helps students explore complex and often very conflicting values and attitudes. They learn to manage new or difficult situations positively and form effective relationships with a wide range of people.

Theme 1: Investigating small business

Written examination - 1hour and 30 minutes. 50% of the qualification. 90 Marks.

Theme 2: Building a business

Written examination - 1hour and 30 minutes. 50% of the qualification. 90 Marks.

What can I do after?

Any achievement in this course can be used as part of an application to a potential college or employer along with other grades the student will have achieved when they leave school. For many courses/places you will be accepted at the discretion of an individual college or employer. Most will require interview and/or an assessment. Please check with the relevant college or employer.

Anything else I need to know?

You will need:

- A good attendance and punctuality record.
- A good behaviour record.
- A real interest and commitment to the subject.

Creative iMedia

OCR Lvl 2

What will I learn in this subject?

Creative iMedia equips students with a wide range of computing knowledge and skills to work in the creative media and computing sector. The focus is on the creative use of technology to produce media products such as websites, graphics interactive displays apps and comic strips.

Who is the course aimed at?

The Level 1/Level 2 Cambridge National in Creative iMedia is aimed at students aged 14-16 years and will develop knowledge, understanding and practical skills that would be used in the media industry. You may be interested in this if you want an engaging qualification where you will use your learning in practical, real-life situations, such as:

- Developing visual identities for clients
- Planning and creating original digital graphics
- Planning, creating and reviewing original digital media products.

This will help you to develop independence and confidence in using skills that would be relevant to the media industry.

The course is made up of 3 Units: Two that are mandatory. One is an optional Unit.

2 internally assessed and one that's externally assessed. You will need good Maths and English Skills for this course.

How will this course benefit me?

The qualification will also help you to develop learning and skills that can be used in other life and work situations, such as:

- Thinking about situations and deciding what is required to be successful
- Exploring different options and choosing the best way forward to a solve problem
- Exploring and generating original ideas to find imaginative solutions to problems
- Selecting the best tools and techniques to use to solve a problem
- Appropriate use of media to convey meaning
- Use of planning techniques to complete tasks in an organised way which meet deadlines.

This qualification will complement other learning that you are completing for GCSEs or vocational qualifications at Key Stage 4 and help to prepare you for further study.

What can I do after?

Any achievement in this course can be used as part of an application to a potential college or employer along with other grades the student will have achieved when they leave school. For many courses/places you will be accepted at the discretion of an individual college or employer. Most will require interview and/or an assessment. Food Preparation & Nutrition

AQA

What will I learn in this subject?

Year 1

Students will have the opportunity to complete a foundation year where they complete practical tasks to develop their food preparation skills.

Year 2 & 3

You will study nutrition, the relationship between diet and health, energy balance, macro and micro nutrients, food provenance, technological developments of food production, development of culinary traditions, food science, food safety and sensory properties.

You will also have the opportunity to develop knife skills through portioning a chicken and filleting fish, create a range of sauces, and investigate ingredients and their properties.

What can I do after the course?

Any achievement in this course can be used as part of an application to a potential college or employer along with other grades you have achieved when you leave school. For many courses/places you will be accepted at the discretion of an individual college or employer. Most will require interview and/or an assessment.

Career opportunities on completion of this GCSE are vast:

How will I be assessed?

50% of the total GCSE will be an exam based on food preparation and nutrition.

15% of the total GCSE will be a food investigation of 1500-2000 words.

35% of the total GCSE will be a food preparation task.

What will I learn in this subject?

Component 1: Exploring music products and styles

Internally assessed, 30% of the course

Students will develop their practical skills in performance, composition and music technology. You will investigate the key features of different musical styles, including pop music through the ages

You can present evidence in the form of:

- Audio recording
- Composition for media, film, TV, adverts and computer games
- Song or composition
- Digital Audio Workstation (DAW) project (Recording studio production)

Component 2: Music skills development

Internally assessed, 30% of the course

Students will have the opportunity to develop two musical disciplines.

Students will participate in workshops and sessions to identify and develop musical skills and techniques in the following 3 disciplines:

- Music performance. 1.
- 2. Creating original music.
- 3. Music production.

Component 3: Responding to a commercial brief

Externally assessed, 40% of the course

Here students will be given the opportunity to develop and present music in response to a given commercial music brief. Features explored:

- Performing stylistically accurate cover versions.
- Creating original music using existing stylistic frameworks and traits.
- Stylistic use of a DAW and associated hardware to create an original piece of music from a given starting point.

Drama is studied from a practical perspective at all times. Lessons will take a workshop format. A variety of activities will be undertaken to secure understanding and progression.

How is it assessed?

This is a practical driven course and assessment is continuous throughout. Component 3 will be subject to external assessment and the other two components will be internally assessed via film, audience and portfolio evidence. This will then be awarded with a final grade of Pass, Merit, Distinction or Distinction* grade.

What can I do after?

The Edexcel BTEC Level 1/2 Tech Award in performing arts provides a suitable foundation for further study within the industry through progression to qualifications such as the Edexcel BTEC Level 3 Nationals in performing arts or an A- Level equivalent. This course will be perfect for students who want to develop subject specific skills and communication skills of all kinds. The course will allow them to develop their theory and performance skills or follow the teaching pathway.

Creative Media Production

Edexcel BTEC LVL 2

What will I learn in this subject?

Audio, moving image, print & interactive media surrounds our daily lives. This forms part of most people's cultural experiences, as well as being a recognised art form of the 21st Century.

This qualification enables students to develop skills across a range of media practices using a combination of practical exploration, experimentation and realistic vocational contexts. You will develop personal skills, such as managing your own creative projects, documenting progress of skills and work, responding to briefs and presenting work through a practical and skills-based approach.

What can I do after?

The Media course provides a suitable foundation for a Level 3 course in any creative subject, especially Creative & Media Production. This course will also be perfect for any student who wants to develop their awareness of how Film and TV are produced alongside the theory behind each production.

How is it assessed?

Component 1: Exploring Media Products (30%)

You will develop your understanding of how media products create meaning for their audiences. You will also examine existing products and explore media production techniques. You will explore media products from each of the three sectors; audio/moving image, print and interactive media.

In the final part of this unit you will examine how media production techniques are combined to create specific effects and engage audiences.

Component 2: Developing Digital Production Skills (30%)

In this component you will develop and apply skills and techniques in media production processes by creating a media product from one of the three main sectors; audio/moving image, print and interactive media.

You will participate in workshops and classes to develop media planning and pre-production skills and techniques, using the knowledge to respond to a creative brief.

Component 3: Create a Media Product in Response to a Brief (40% Externally Assessed)

In this component you will apply and develop your planning and production skills and techniques to create a media product in response to a client brief. Products might include:

- Audio/moving image, e.g. podcasts, radio, audio guide, news, feature package, advertisement, trailer, viral video, promotional video, short film, animation.
- Print e.g. magazine, brochure, marketing material, newspaper, advertorial, leaflet.
- Interactive Media e.g. game demo, website, app, interactive magazine, HTML newspaper.

What is the difference between this course and the normal science course?

All pupils take core science, but this only gives them 2 GCSE's in the subject. If your child does not take this option it does not mean they will not do science at GCSE!

Triple award science allows pupils to gain separate GCSE grades in Biology, Chemistry and Physics. Student who choose Triple Science will gain extra time studying science so they can develop deep understanding of Biology, Chemistry and Physics.
