Attendance Matters @ NLC

It is important to have a good education and at NLC we want to give your child the best possible start to be fully prepared for their life after



school. Your child's chances of a successful future can be affected by their attendance; students who miss even a small amount of school can struggle to catch up with any missed learning. Statistically, those students who have an outstanding attendance record in school perform better throughout their education and in their final exams.

Each student has a target of 95% for their attendance over the academic year and this is something we celebrate each term with our students through certificates, prize draws, achievement points and weekly early lunch passes! Throughout this academic year we have had 58 students with 100% attendance 309 of our students achieving 95% and above attendance; this is definitely worth celebrating, however we are always striving to be better and you can support us in making sure your child attends school regularly to ensure they are given the best possible chances of achieving throughout their education.


The students enjoyed a red carpet reception, a buffet and then partied the night away, along with their teachers and Miss Diskin leading the way!

Online Safety @ NLC

ICT and online technology is an everyday part of people's lives and schools are making increasing use of new technology. At Netherhall Learning Campus we have systems in place to protect your children when they are online, but we recognise that we encourage students to go online for work out of school where there is less supervision and they have more freedom.



Golden rules to safe internet browsing

- Children should only add people on social media and join groups online with people they know, and trust, in real life.
- Some predatory paedophiles can and do convincingly pose as another teenager and may spend months or years 'grooming' the victim until they meet face to face.
- Don't ban children from these sites (Facebook, Snapchat, Instagram); they will just use them at friend's houses or on their phone, personal media player or hand-held games console.
- Take an interest and suggest they add you as a friend so you can keep an eye on them when they first join.
- Have the main computer in a communal area of the home where there
 is passive supervision and be reasonable about time online. Talk if you
 feel it's getting out of hand (but remember how many hours you spent
 watching TV when you were their age the internet is at least active
 not passive and they can learn a lot from it).
- If they have a wireless laptop and you want to stop them going online after a quota of hours is up, unplug the 'router' where the phone line comes into the house.

What to look for on a website

- The CEOP report button is the online equivalent of dialling 999.
- We need to train young people, just like we do with 999, to recognise it and know how to use it if they need to.
- Look out for good websites that have the button built in.
- Some websites refuse to add the button, so visit direct: www.ceop.police.uk

Holiday Activities


The school holiday activity programme is designed to deliver fun & accessible activities for children & young people in Rawthorpe & Dalton.

Team GB PE Visit

In the build up to our Interform Athletics Championship on Thursday 4th July the PE department welcomed Laura Samuel. Laura is a professional athlete who competes in the triple jump. She has a personal best of 14.09m which ranks her third among British women. She represented TEAM GB in the 2014 Commonwealth Games and won a silver medal!

Laura's visit involved our year 7 & 8 pupils taking part in a sponsored fitness session. The challenge included star jumps, tricep dips, press ups, mountain climbers and burpees. Laura was very impressed with our pupils' positive attitudes and enthusiasm throughout all three sessions. Pupils who achieved significant fund raising targets won prizes, such as signed post cards & posters and individual photographs with Laura. At the end of the sessions Laura talked about her personal journey into athletics, her fitness regime and how to have a healthy diet. Pupil's also had the opportunity to ask her questions and take a close look at her silver medal. Hopefully Laura will have inspired our pupils to take part in our Interform Athletics Championship on Friday 12th July and possibly even join their local athletics club in the future.

Interform Athletics Championship

On Friday 12th July NLC hosted the Interform Athletics Championship. Each tutor group entered a team and pupils were able to take part in a range of different athletic events throughout the day, this included a range of field events; shot putt, javelin, long jump and triple jump, track events; 100m, 200m, 400m, 800m and relays. Pupils were engaged throughout the day and worked hard to try and be the best form team in their year group. Students were keen to impress and it was an excellent atmosphere throughout the day.



Rachael also ran a specialist workshop for our GCSE citizenship students from year 9. In this session students acted out a debate in parliament taking different roles and putting forward different arguments.

The day was organised by Sarah Hymanforth, teacher of citizenship and she was very impressed with the focus and excellent attitudes from all our year 9 students involved "Students were outstanding throughout the day and engaged with all aspects of the visit allowing them to take part in several interactive votes. Netherfest 2019

World Music Day is an event celebrated around the globe each year, where free public events take place on or around the 20th/21st June. This year Netherhall Learning Campus and The Creative & Media Studio School decided to celebrate the event with live music around the campus for the day; aptly named 'Netherfest 2019', taking place on our newly built 'Pyramid Stage'.

Over 200 young people were involved in the two performances at our outdoor performance arena. The performers were supported by the rest of the students from across the NLC Campus and Creative & Media Studio School who were able to watch the all-day event in a music festival setting.

World Music Day originated in France in 1982. Since then the idea has spread across the globe with each event holding to the same simple set of principles: that the day is held on the mid-summer solstice and that all concerts and events are free and accessible to the public.

Throughout the day there were performances by the Wind Band, GLEE@NLC, four of our Steel bands, and 20 rock bands from across NLC and CMSS.

On three separate dates in June 2019, 45 year 9 and 10 business studies students from NLC attended the Innov8 Enterprise Challenge! Each group of five students had four challenge tasks to complete, from creating structures from raw materials and adapting existing products to meet a gap in the market to creating a brand new product and marketing it!

Two students on each day are chosen by the college staff that show outstanding leadership qualities or outstanding effort levels. On the second day of the challenge, 85 pupils attended the challenge day, yet our very own Aiden Black in year 9 shone through and is now the proud owner of a hoody that reminds him of his achievement of 'Businessman' of the day! On the third day of the challenge, Robert Ellam, year 9 went on to secure NLC their second triumph beating 104 other pupils to also be crowned 'Businessman' of the day! Well done Aiden and Robert but also all well done to all NLC pupils who attended and excelled in the event from the business department!

ICT & Business Challenge

On Friday May 24th a group of year 10 and 12 pupils went to the University of Law, Business and Policing to take part in a challenge day alongside Carni Le, head of ICT/business. Pupils took part in workshops analysing existing successful business strategies, looking into the successes of the leading entrepreneurs of their time and creating a marketing campaign for a new sector. Pupil's then got to experience a live courtroom experience, the boardroom and had a tour of the campus! The day was an excellent enrichment opportunity for our students to be involved in the real world of law and business, giving them a direct insight into the expectations of university life.



The HUB @ NLC

The HUB at NLC is a nurture provision where students work in a small group developing life skills and completing a range of project based learning activities. The most recent project has been based on developing an awareness of our environment through gardening activities. The children who learn in the HUB have undertaken a massive challenge to turn a derelict area of the school into a productive vegetable garden. The students have created a HUB designated garden space with benches and their own outside dining area! The students wanted to share their hard work and achievements with parents and set up a HUB garden party. The garden party included parents, teachers and external agencies that were treated to an array of cakes and buns, whilst admiring their gardening skills!

Friendship Group

The 'Friendship Group' is a group that has been established by the high school's Sally Barrington. Meetings are held on the final Tuesday of each month in the community centre from 3.00pm -4.30pm whereby students with additional and special educational needs, and their parents, are invited to do activities and have refreshments with a view to helping them with social situations, building their confidence, raising their self-esteem and importantly making new friends. Recently the friendship group have raised £18.00 through a bun sale and worked to make their own mother's day cards.

Outside agencies also attend to provide advice and guidance for instance the charity PCAN (Parents of Children with Additional Needs), and the autistic outreach from Honley. The recent meeting was Easter themed, with the children making cards and eating sweet treats! Activities vary at each meeting and all students are encouraged to take an active part in deciding what they would like to focus on.

The friendship group continue to raise money for PCAN through a range of different fundraising activities. It will be the start of fundraising for them in an effort to form a greater link with PCAN and the school. We held a special friendship group meeting on the 3rd July where year 6 students and their parents joined us, this helped to ease the concerns of those joining us in September and allowed some students to start making new friends within the high school setting.
