Teacher note: (Engaging) Allow the children time to share their ideas on what is trust before looking at the 4 suggested answers.

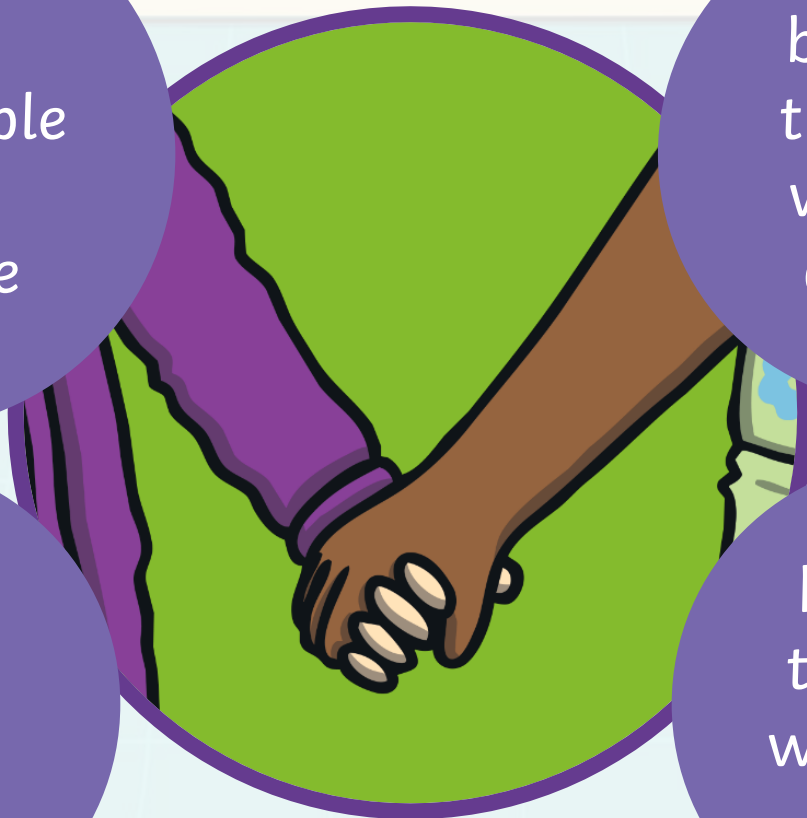

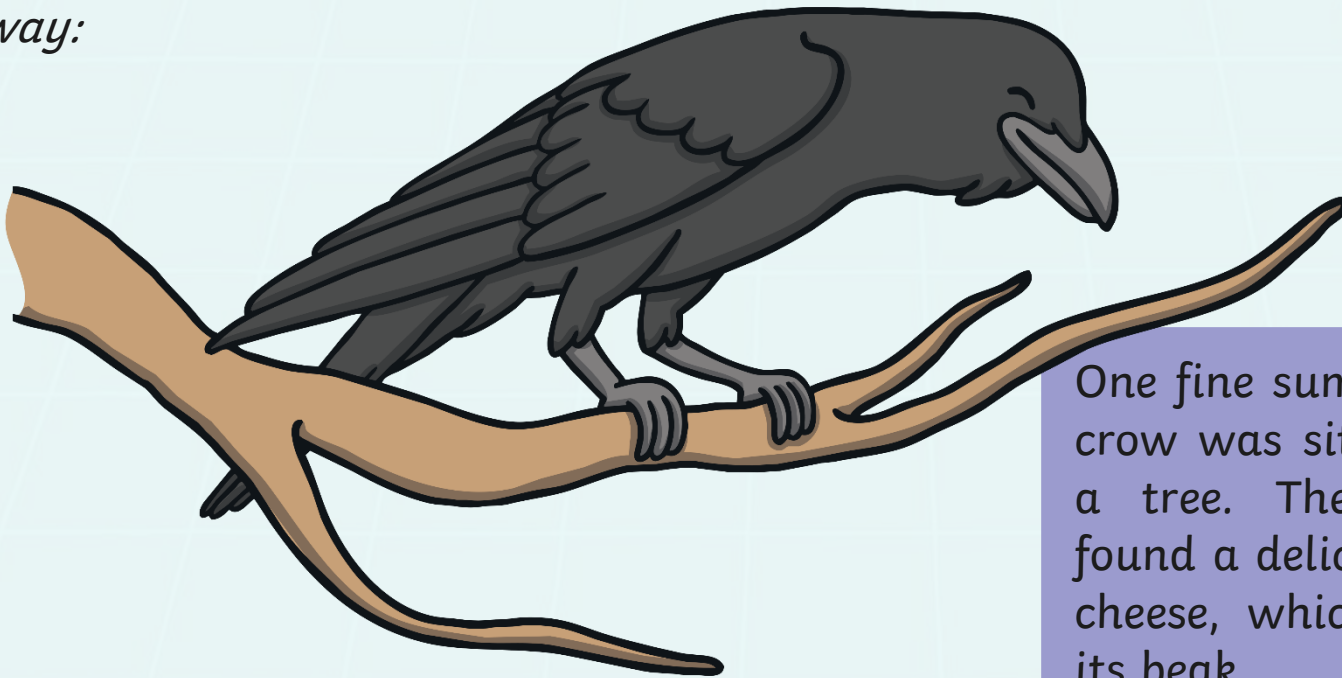

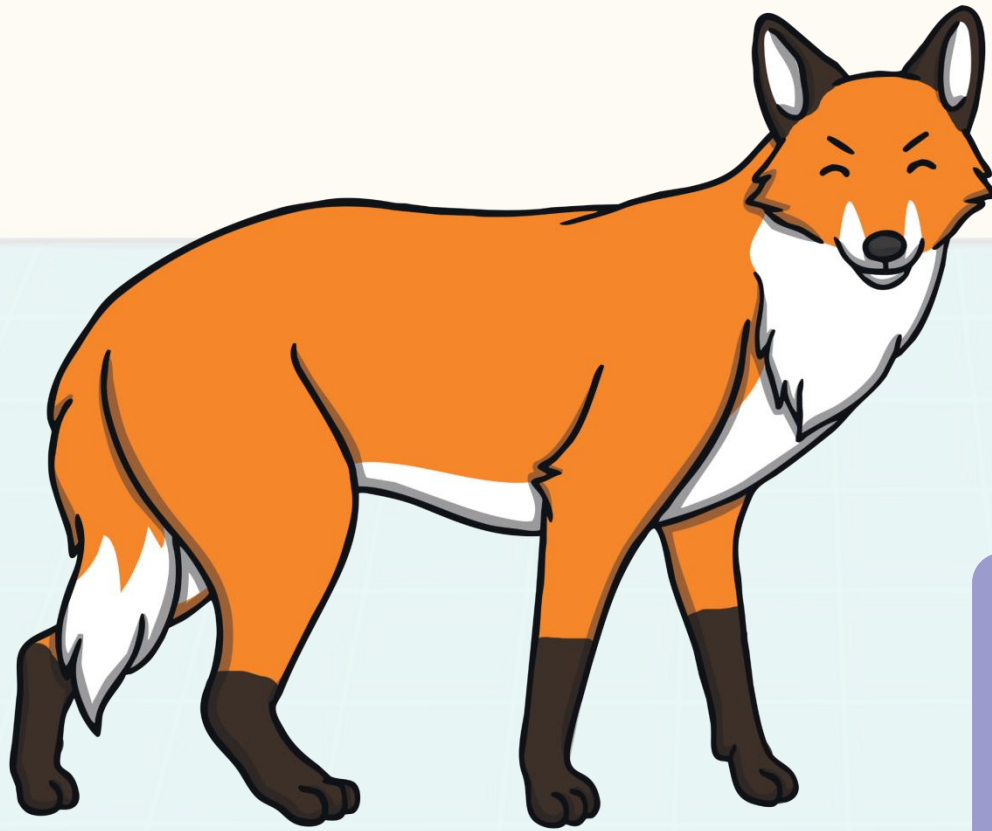
The Fox and the Crow

A fable is a short story, typically with animals as characters, that help teach us how to behave the right way:



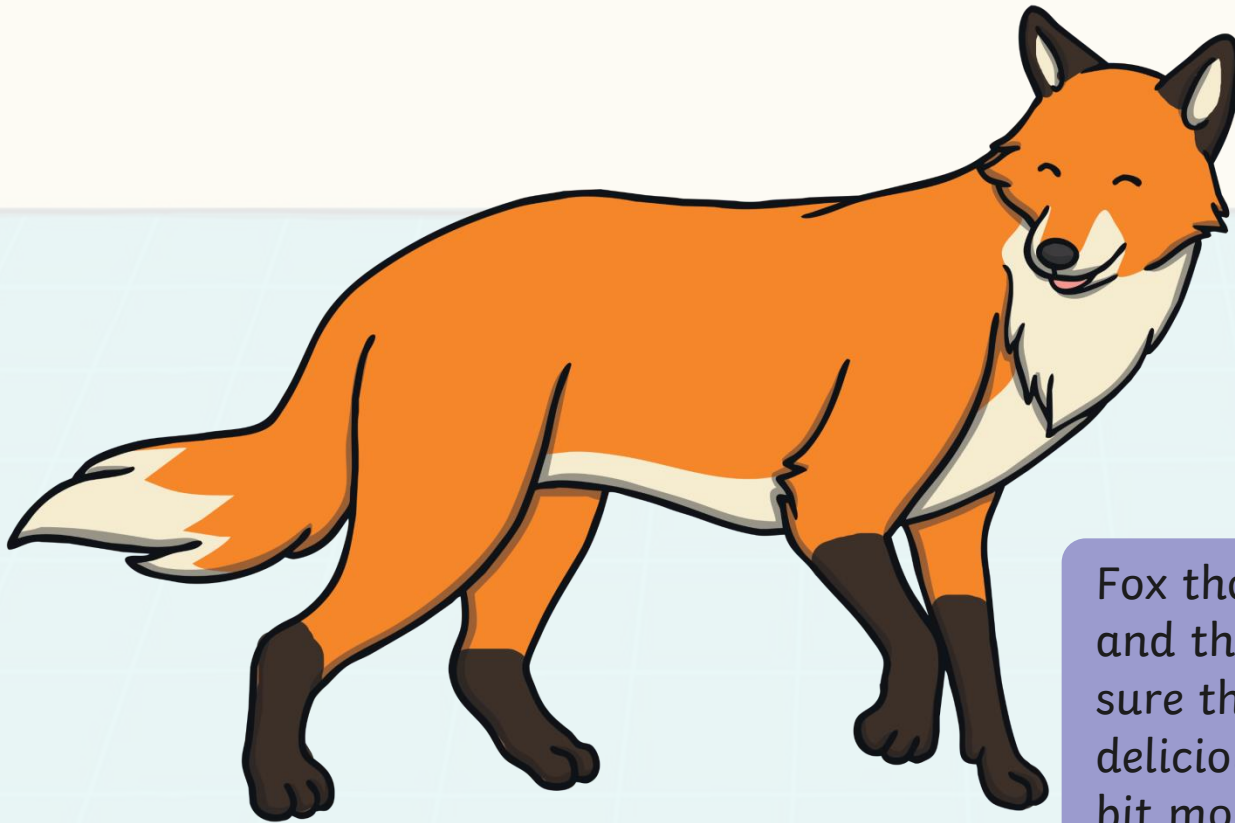
One fine summers day, a crow was sitting high in a tree. The crow had found a delicious piece of cheese, which it held in its beak.



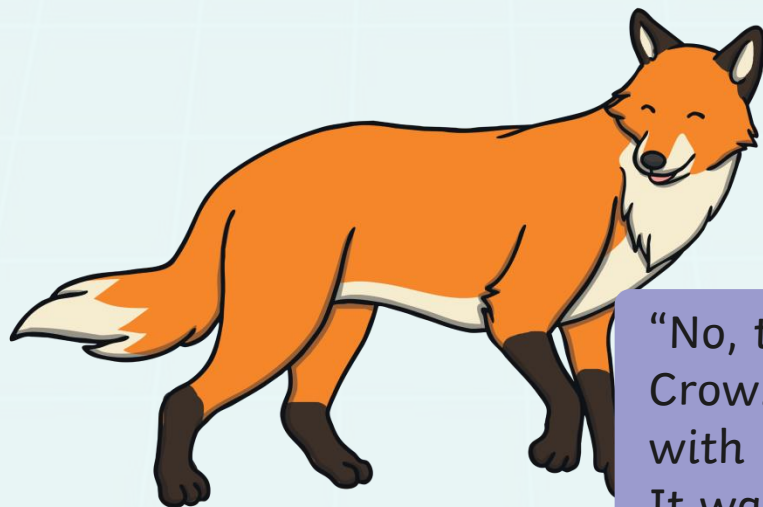
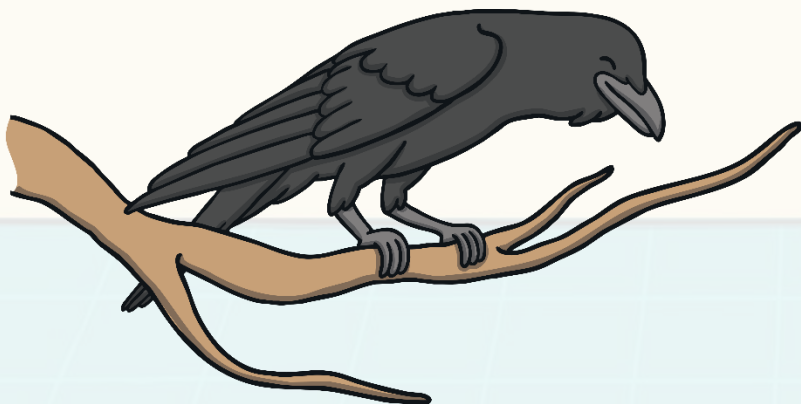

“No, thank you!” said Crow. “I am happy here, with my delicious cheese.”



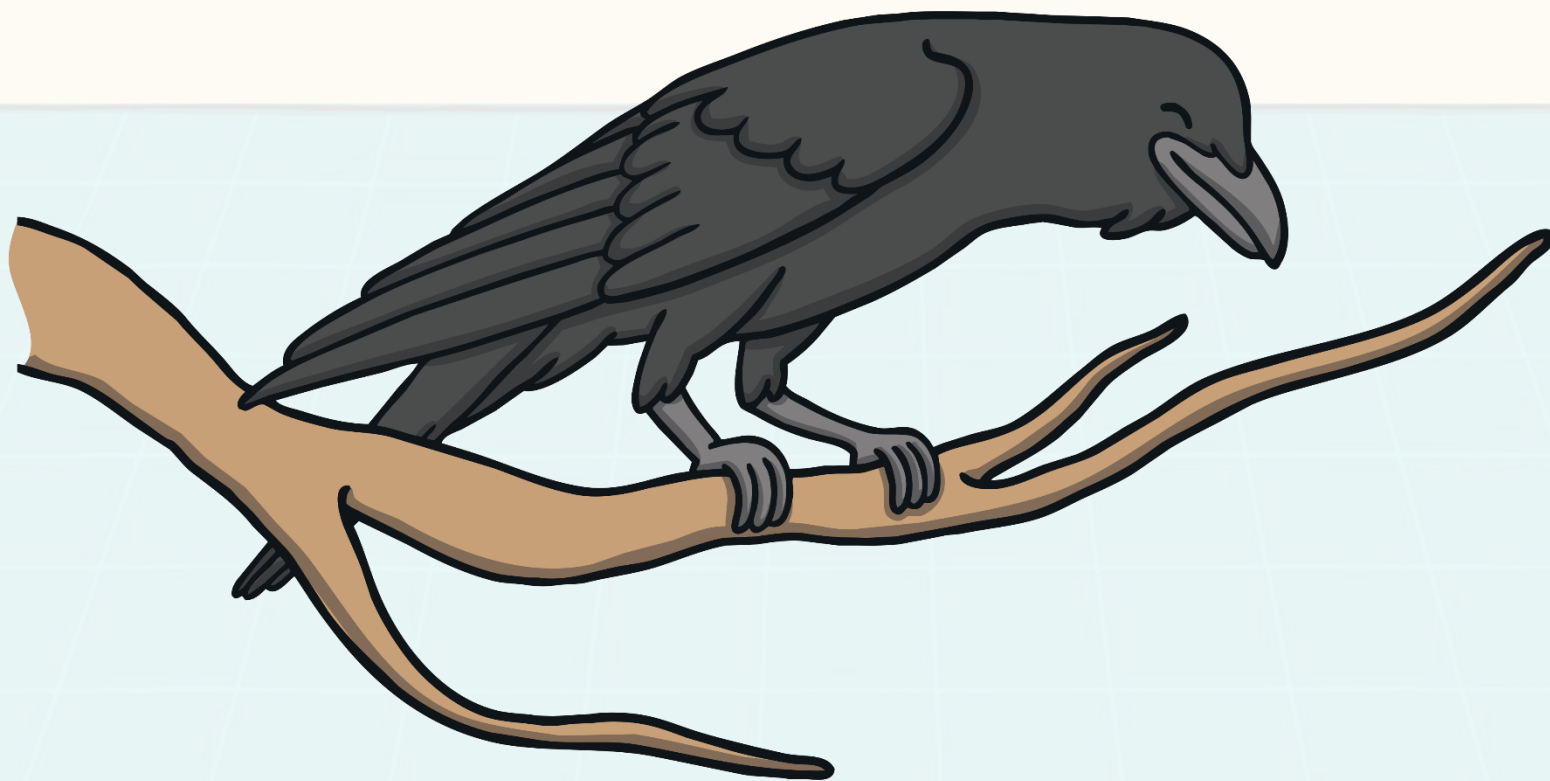

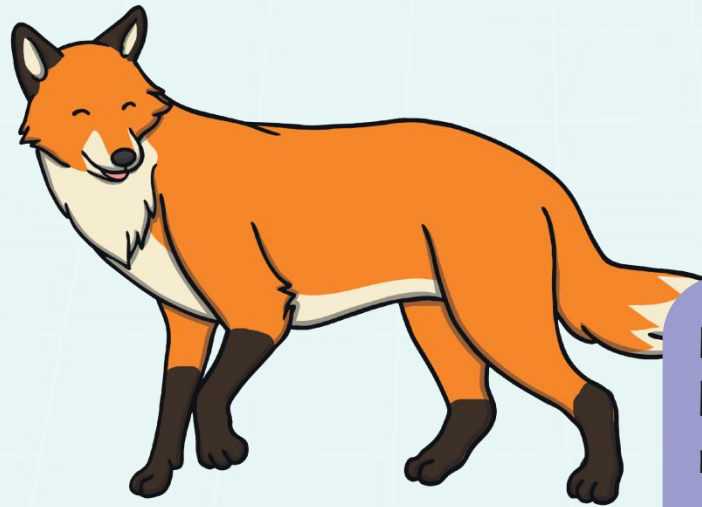
"No, thank you!" said Crow. "I am happy here, with my delicious cheese. It was fresh when I found it this morning."



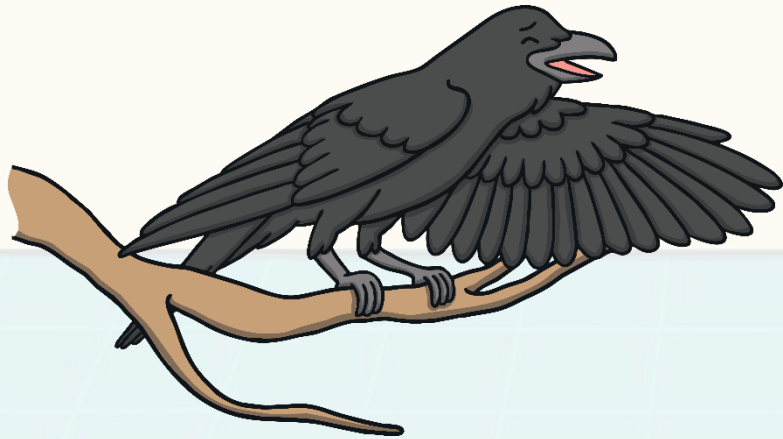
"OK, Crow," Fox replied.

Crow looked very pleased to have received such a fine compliment.



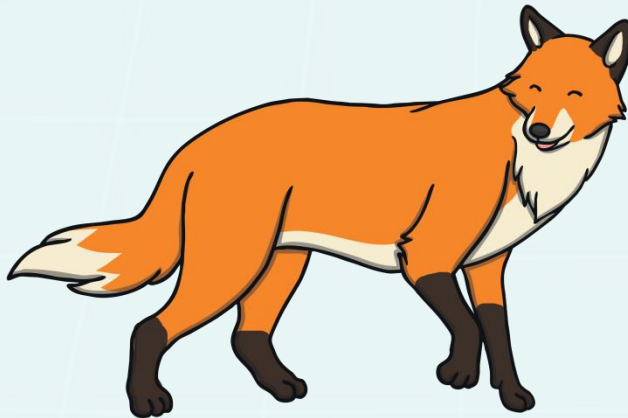
Fox continued, "I've also heard that you have the most wonderful singing voice in the whole forest. Before I go, would it be possible for you to sing a song to see me on my way?"

Discuss

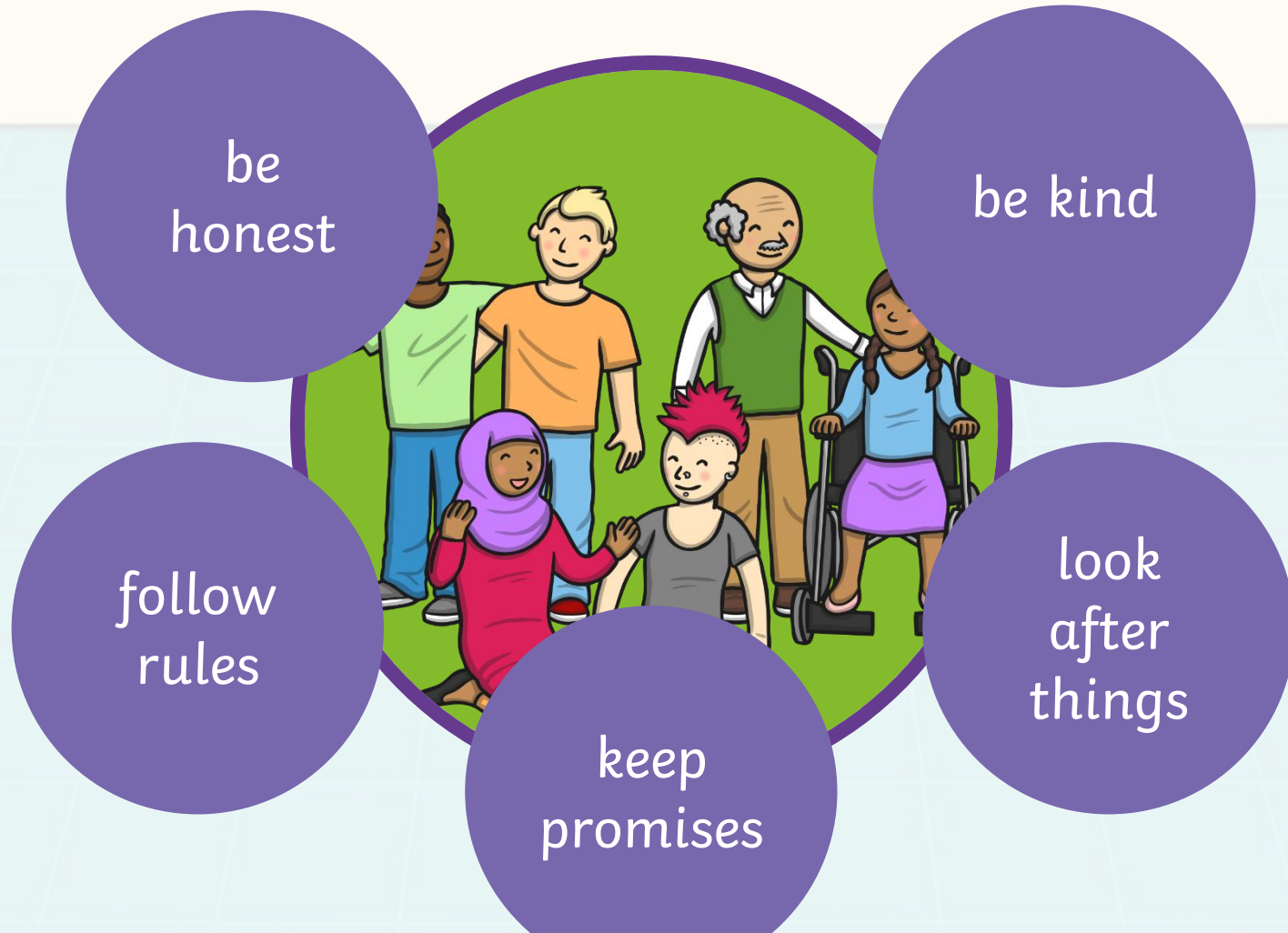
This story was trying to teach us that:
