We hope you enjoy reading the insights of our busy life here at NLC High School - it certainly has been an exciting and rewarding term.

On behalf of the high school staff, we would like to thank you for your support and would like to wish you a peaceful and happy Easter break.

Attendance Matters @ NLC



It is important to have a good education and at Netherhall Learning Campus we want to give your child the best possible start to be fully prepared for their life after school. Your child's chances of a successful future can be affected by their attendance; pupils who miss even a small amount of school can struggle to catch up with any missed learning. Statistically, students who have an outstanding attendance record in school perform better throughout their education and in their final exams.

Each student has a target of 95% for their attendance over the academic year and this is something we celebrate each term with our students through certificates, prize draws, achievement points and weekly early lunch passes! This spring term we have had 224 students, 40% of the school, achieving a 100% attendance record and 63% of our students achieving 95% and above attendance; this is definitely worth celebrating, however we are always striving to be better and you can support us in making sure your child attends school regularly to ensure they are given the best possible chances of achieving throughout their education.

Exam Stress! How can I help my child?

Exams are a stressful time for any young person. Mood swings and outbursts are more likely to occur during this period. Look out for other signs that your child may be struggling, including poor sleep patterns or a change in appetite or behaviour. It's worth preparing ways of supporting your child during exam weeks and thinking about how you will react and respond on the day if they don't get the result that they, or you, are hoping for.

These are things that can really make a difference:

- 1. Work with your child to find what revision style works for them.
- 2. Encourage your child to take revision breaks and find a balance between studying and doing things they find enjoyable and relaxing.
- 3. Make sure they are eating and drinking at regular intervals.
- 4. Encourage them to take some time after revising to wind down.
- 5. Reassure them reinforce that you are and will be proud of them no matter what happens.
- 6. Remain positive and hopeful!
- 7. Plan a treat or an activity together to mark the end of the exams.
- 8. Set aside one to one time so that they can talk to you about any worries.
- 9. Let them know their feelings are valid and normal, but also offer support and solutions where possible.
- 10. Anxiety is often worst at night and this means it is useful to encourage good bedtime routine
- 11. Work with them to develop relaxation techniques.
- 12. If anxiety and stress start impacting their day-to-day life seek help from vour GP.

Online Safety @ NLC

ICT and online technology is an everyday part of people's lives and schools are making increasing use of new technology. At Netherhall Learning Campus we have systems in place to protect your children when they are online, but we recognise that students are encouraged to go online for work out of school where there is less supervision and they have more freedom.

Golden Rules to Safe Internet Browsing

- Children should only add people on social media and join groups online with people they know, and trust, in real life.
- Some predatory paedophiles can and do convincingly pose as another teenager and may spend months or years 'grooming' the victim until they meet face to face.
- Don't ban children from these sites (Facebook, Snapchat, Instagram); they will just use them at friend's houses or on their phone, personal media player or hand-held games console.
- Take an interest and suggest they add you as a friend so you can keep an eye on them when they first join.
- Have the main computer in a communal area of the home where there
 is passive supervision and be reasonable about time online. Talk if you
 feel it's getting out of hand (but remember how many hours you spent
 watching TV when you were their age the internet is at least active
 not passive and they can learn a lot from it).
- If they have a wireless laptop and you want to stop them going online after a quota of hours is up, unplug the 'router' where the phone line comes into the house.

What to Look for on a Website.

- The CEOP report button is the online equivalent of dialling 999.
- We need to train young people, just like we do with 999, to recognise it and know how to use it if they need to.
- Look out for good websites that have the button built in.
- Some websites refuse to add the button, so visit direct: www.ceop.police.uk

Karate at NLC


Always aiming to increase the variety of sports and activities in the PE department, a highly experienced Karate Instructor has been into NLC to deliver taster sessions to year 7's.



HD5 Community Hub

Kirklees Community Hubs are made up from a number of schools working together with partner agencies; there are 17 hubs in Kirklees. HD5 hub is all of the schools on the Netherhall/Rawthorpe Campus. The aim is to work collaboratively with service providers focussing on key areas of concern for our community. Cat Willetts and Sam Diskin have recently set up the HD5 hub and are meeting with key service providers to look at how they can support our community. We will be looking at regular coffee mornings where parents/carers can drop in for a cuppa and get advice on a number of issues ranging from employment, housing, parent support etc.

We will provide you with regular updates to inform what is available and happening within our community.

Recently, a number of you completed a survey about our community, this is what you said:

- In your own words, what things do you most like about living in this area?
 28% of you said that you liked the community spirit. Other main points were the schools and local amenities.
- 2. In your own words, what could be better about the area?

35% of you said that we needed more activities for students and families to access. Other key points were to make it safer and to clean it up.

3. In your opinion what, if any, are the main challenges faced by the community in this area?

46% of you said that crime and gangs were the main challenge. Other key points were poverty and lack of inspiration for our young people.

4. In your own words what, if any, are the challenges faced by your family?
30% of you said crime and keeping your children

safe. 17% of you stated that poverty and finances was a big challenge.

We have recently appointed a Community Hub Coordinator, Alice Thomas, who will be working closely with the councillors and key service providers, along with other hub co-ordinators, to look at what they can do for our community, not just with words but actions! We do have community plus workers based at the library and information centre on Ridgeway, they can advise on local issues.

BIMM

In January we had a visit to the music Department of BIMM - British and Irish Modern Music Institute. The British and Irish Modern Music (BIMM) Institute is a group of eight independent colleges with over 6,000 students that specialise in popular music degree level education.

During their visit they did a performance workshop with our year 12 students who were preparing for their performance recitals.

Huddersfield University Visit

In March the music department were visited by Becky Lundberg from Huddersfield University. Becky is a lead tutor in music and Education at the university, as well as an acclaimed international trombone soloist.

She gave year 12 and 13 students an insight into music pathways at university, as well as some performance tips and advice for upcoming recitals and university auditions.

The Royal Northern College of Music

The Music Department are now planning a trip to the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester in the summer term, where many of our current year 12 students hope to study next year.

Faraday Sessions

Last year Andrew Ring bid for our school to a host a Faraday Challenge Day.

Only 116 schools nationwide get these events and so we did extremely well to get selected as a participating school. The Faraday Challenge Days give students the opportunity to research, design and make solutions to genuinely tough engineering problems. The event was set up and run by a team of STEM professionals and involved 36 of our year 8 pupils. Ena Basic helped organise the event that saw our pupils design a range of projects centred around the development of an infra-red telescope that would be sent into space. The pupils had to apply an array of real world problem solving and team work skills whilst working to a set budget. Pupils then had to pitch their idea to the judging panel with the winning team each receiving an amazon voucher for their ideas and hard work. The event was a massive success and we will be bidding to host it again next year!





The Message Trust 'Identity'

On Thursday 28th March, The Message Trust sent their band, 'Social Beingz' to NLC to perform and answer questions to year 7, 8 and 9 discussing matters of self-esteem and identity through discussion and music.

Students were immediately engaged and they were immersed in the performance throughout. The group explained how their faith in Christianity has allowed them to value, love and accept who they are regardless of other opinion. Students asked questions, joined in with dancing and even spoke to the band about how to go into a career in music. Well done to year 7, 8 and 9 for your participation with the group, with a special mention to year 9 who the band specifically said engaged with the discussions more than they had experienced in a long time.



The Friendship Group

The 'Friendship Group' is a group that has been established by the high school's Educational Teaching Manager, Sally Barrington-Parker. Meetings are held on the final Tuesday of each month in the community centre from 3.00pm - 4.30pm whereby students with additional and special educational needs, and their parents, are invited to do activities and have refreshments with a view to helping them with social situations, building their confidence, raising their self-esteem and importantly making new friends.

Outside agencies also attend to provide advice and guidance for instance the charity PCAN (Parents of Children with Additional Needs), and the Autistic Outreach from Honley. The recent meeting was Easter themed, with the children making cards and eating sweet treats! Activities vary at each meeting and all students are encouraged to take an active part in deciding what they would like to focus on.

The friendship group continue to raise money for PCAN through a range of different fundraising activities. It will be the start of fundraising for them in an effort to form a greater link with PCAN and the school. The children at the junior school in year 5 and 6 are also invited! BRAVE Workshop

On the 17th January we ran a series of special assemblies commissioned through the West Yorkshire Police and the St Giles Trust. The assemblies focused on tackling gang exploitation, violence and extremism and were funded by the Home Office. The sessions covered an important, but at times, challenging topic that really highlighted the dangers around extremist behaviour, whilst offering clear guidelines to students about how to keep yourself safe.
