



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#### Music and drama in school

All pupils should have access to a quality arts education. Music and drama build confidence and help children live happier, more enriched lives, and discover the joy of expressing themselves. There may, however, be an additional risk of infection in environments where singing, chanting, playing wind or brass instruments and drama takes place. Singing, wind and brass instrument playing can be undertaken in line with the particular guidance provided by the DCMS for professionals and non-professionals, available at working safely during coronavirus (COVID-19): performing arts.

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#### Minimising contact between individuals

Netherhall Learning Campus Health and Safety Risk Assessment In all subject areas we will do everything possible to minimise contacts and mixing. We will reduce the number of contacts between pupils/students and staff. This will be achieved through keeping groups separate (in bubbles) and through maintaining the social distance between individuals. Both measures will help, but the balance between them will change depending on the age of pupils, the layout of the building, and the feasibility of keeping groups separate from each other while offering a broad curriculum. If staff need to move between classes and year groups, they should try and keep their distance from pupils and other staff as much as they can, ideally 2 metres from other adults. Additionally, any background or accompanying music levels which do not encourage teachers or other performers to raise their voices unduly will be removed. Where appropriate microphones will be used to reduce the need for shouting or prolonged periods of loud speaking or singing. Where equipment may be shared e.g. microphones the following guidance will be adhered to handling equipment.

#### Performances

Under current restrictions the school is not planning on any indoor or outdoor face-to-face performance in front of a live audience.

#### Peripatetic teachers

Schools will continue to engage peripatetic teachers during this period, including staff from music education hubs.

Peripatetic teachers will move between schools, but you should consider how to minimise the number of visitors where possible. All will be expected to comply with arrangements for managing and minimising risk, including taking particular care to maintain distance from other staff and pupils.

If a teacher is operating on a peripatetic basis, and operating across multiple groups or individuals, it is important that they do not attend a lesson if they are unwell or are having any symptoms associated with coronavirus (COVID-19) such as fever, a new and sustained cough, loss of sense of taste or smell. In addition, they should:

- 1. Maintain distancing requirements with each group they teach, where appropriate.
- 2. Avoid situations where distancing requirements are broken; for an example demonstrating partnering work in dancing.
- 3. Make efforts to reduce the number of groups taught and locations worked in, to reduce the number of contacts made.

# Music teaching in school, including singing, and playing wind and brass instruments in groups

#### • Playing indoors

We will use a room with as much space as possible, for example, larger rooms; rooms with high ceilings are expected to enable dilution of aerosol transmission. We will also limit the numbers to account for ventilation of the space and the ability to social distance. It is vitally important to ensure good ventilation. Advice on this can be found in Health and Safety Executive guidance on <u>air conditioning and ventilation during the coronavirus outbreak</u>.

# • Singing, wind and brass playing

Singing, wind and brass playing should not take place in larger groups such as choirs and ensembles, or assemblies unless significant space, natural airflow of at least 10l/s/person for all present and strict social distancing and mitigation as described below can be maintained.

# • Social distancing

In the smaller groups where these activities can take place, we will observe strict social distancing between each singer and player, and between singers and players, and any other people such as conductors, other musicians, or accompanists. Current guidance is that if the activity is face-to-face and without mitigating actions, 2 metres is appropriate.

# • Seating positions

Pupils should be positioned back-to-back or side-to-side when playing or singing (rather than face-to-face) whenever possible. Position wind and brass players so that the air from their instrument does not blow into another player.

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• Microphones

Use microphones where possible or encourage singing quietly.

By considering and adopting these cumulative risk mitigation measures, the overall risk will be reduced.

#### Handling equipment and instruments

Measures to take when handling equipment, including instruments, include the following.

• Handwashing

Requiring increased handwashing before and after handling equipment, especially if being used by more than one person.

• Avoiding sharing instruments

Avoid sharing equipment wherever possible. If instruments and equipment have to be shared, disinfect regularly (including any packing cases, handles, props, chairs, microphones and music stands) and always between users, following government guidance on cleaning and handling equipment available at <u>hygiene: handwashing, sanitation facilities and toilets</u>. Instruments should be cleaned by the pupils playing them, where possible.

• Individual lessons and performance in groups

In individual lessons for music and drama, social distancing should be maintained wherever possible, meaning teachers should not provide physical correction.

# Physical activity in school

Schools have the flexibility to decide how physical education, sport and physical activity will be provided whilst following the measures in their system of controls. Sports whose national governing bodies have developed guidance under the principles of the government's guidance on team sport and been approved by the government are permitted.

We only provide team sports on the list available at return to recreational team sport framework.

Pupils will be kept in consistent groups, sports equipment thoroughly cleaned between each use by different individual groups.

Outdoor sports will be prioritised where possible, and large indoor spaces used where it is not, maximising natural ventilation flows (through opening windows and doors or using air conditioning systems wherever possible) distancing between pupils and paying scrupulous attention to cleaning and hygiene.

Schools will refer to the following guidance:

- guidance on the phased return of sport and recreation and guidance from Sport England for grassroots sport
- advice from organisations such as the <u>Association for Physical Education</u> and the <u>Youth Sport Trust</u>
- guidance from Swim England on school swimming and water safety lessons available at returning to pools guidance documents
- using changing rooms safely

Schools are able to work with external coaches, clubs and organisations for curricular and extra-curricular activities where they are satisfied that it is safe to do so. Schools should consider carefully how such arrangements can operate within their wider protective measures.

Activities such as active miles, making break times and lessons active and encouraging active travel help to enable pupils to be physically active while encouraging physical distancing.
